Follow their madcap adventures as they whisk the children back in time to the Christmas pageant in the 1940s where their grandparents fell in love. See how the elves and the children help their grandparents to find each other, almost ruin everything, and, in the end, save the pageant, their grandparents' relationship,

and their chances of returning home. Armed with information about their grandparents as young people, the children are able to unlock the love within their grandfather and help him to see how their grandmother's spirit lives on to make Christmas extra special always.

# Are you an artist?

People are always seeking to label each other. It seems to give us comfort to be able to define someone within a category. Black, white, Republican, Democrat...the list is endless. As a photojournalist, I have traveled both domestically and abroad during the past decade, and my personal experiences have convinced me that these labels do nothing to further our understanding of differing viewpoints or encourage relationships. In fact, they generally divide us unnecessarily.

A point that comes up with relative frequency is whether I consider myself an "artist." This can be a difficult question to answer, particularly when the answer people are looking for is as simple as the label they're seeking to apply: Yes or No?

I make the majority of my living as a photojournalist. I cover the news. This carries with it an expectation of truth, honesty, and transparency. I would never consider my news photography to be "art." However, I do strive to be artistic in my visual interpretation of the world around me. I use camera angle, lens selection and depth-of-field to visually represent the reality in front of me. Photographs have the ability to define our present and shape our future, particularly in the context of photojournalism. This is a responsibility not to be taken lightly.


On the other hand, using the medium of photography for "art" purposes can mean many things. The ethical rules of photojournalism do not apply, and the artist is free to use the medium as he chooses. Digital manipulation and staging elaborate film-like scenes are common tools used to reflect some artists' visions. Both are career ending no-no's to a photojournalist.

I'd consider my personal work to fall somewhere in between these two extremes. I do make pictures purely for my love of the process, but I continue to use my camera to document the world around me as it presents itself. With no client storyline to follow, I'm free to make a picture of anything I choose, but it doesn't mean I manipulate things to fit my vision. Many photographers call this genre "fine art," which serves only as a way to differentiate it from work done for client purposes. Basically, you're making pictures because you want to make pictures, not because you're being paid for it.

I suppose my personal definition of an artist is someone who makes their livelihood selling artwork. I've had a few gallery shows, and I've sold a few images over the years, but it has never been the focus of my energy. Perhaps this will change at some point in my life, but for now you can just call me a photographer.

front of the big windows facing the water at my Wisconsin home. I always find something new and interesting on the water. It is more than a matter of form — the composition, reflections, movement, all that. What draws me is something more still and, for want of better words, spiritual, profound."

Dana Collins retired from college teaching in 2004 and currently conducts workshops in studio teaching throughout the Midwest and California, and has presented illustrated lectures on "Working on the Water." Her work was recently exhibited at Outside the Lines Art Gallery in Dubuque, Iowa. She enjoys gardening, writing poetry, and plays the viola with the Illinois Valley Symphony Orchestra.
