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Gallery to feature pottery with 'pop'

Karen Russell, a ceramicist who lives in Barrington, Illinois, will be our featured artist for the month of May. Karen creates handbuilt pottery, each piece containing some kind of botanical embellishment and most always a ladybug for "a pop of red."



Her creations are both beautiful and functional. Her plates, platters, bowls, and ever-popular berry bowls are each decorated with hand-built, three-dimensional botanical embellishments, From

flowers to fruit and pinecones to pine needles, she carefully fashions these embellishments in a realistic way and then attaches them to her pieces.

Eleven years ago, she signed up for a pottery class and took another and then another and kept on taking them. "I pretty soon ended up with two kilns in my basement," Karen said.

Karen has a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and a master's in education. She has taken countless classes in pottery and studied botanical drawing with an instructor from the Art Institute of Chicago.

Although Karen's pottery is considered



functional, many people would agree that it is too beautiful to use. Gazing upon the beauty of her seemingly realistic impressions in her botanical embellishments, one can't help but appreciate the beauty of each piece.

Karen continues to sell her works at art shows across Illinois and Wisconsin. She has

traveled as far as Pennsylvania, Minnesota and Delaware. Several stores in the Chicago suburbs have sold her pieces. Last summer she was juried into the Chicago Botanic Garden Art Festival. Karen's pottery can also be seen at Sweeties on South Main Street in Princeton.

WEBER HOUSE AND GARDEN TOUR

Join us on this fascinating tour of the Weber House and Gardens. Situated on a two-acre lot on a busy street in Streator, Illinois, one has no idea what is behind that mysterious, handsome, red wooden gate that is so densely surrounded by ivy that one has no idea what they are to embark upon.

Upon approaching the red wooden gate, no one can enter until the bell is rung. Ted Weber personally greets his guests. Upon entering, you are immediately surrounded by beauty and awe as a crushed stone path leads you through a series of garden "rooms." As you walk the meandering paths throughout the English gardens full of roses, hollyhocks and old oaks, one can't help but view the storybook, Tudor-style Weber house, itself full of stories and history. The garden tour ends at the Luther Hall, where guests are served refreshments.

After touring the outside gardens, Ted Weber, a long-time Chicago radio and television personality, will lead you throughout the old Weber House describing the fascinating history of the house. The tour ends in the basement where Weber will recount some of his stories of well known television stars and political figures whom he has interviewed throughout his profession that spanned the 1960s.

Painting florals with oil

If you have ever wanted to learn how to paint flowers with oil paints, this class is for you. Lorraine Cabral, recently featured in the *Illinois Valley Living* spring 2013 magazine, has been painting floral pictures for over 20 years. She has mastered the art of painting flowers and enjoys sharing and teaching what she learned from American floral painter Gary Jenkins, who has published many art books and instructional videos on the art of floral and landscape painting. This is a four-week class with emphasis on floral painting tech-



niques. Students will complete an 16 x 20 painting on canvas. This class is intended for the beginner to intermediate level. Students should have some prior oil painting experience. Please bring a 16 x 20 canvas, odorless turpentine, 9 x 12 tracing pad and paints. Brushes should include #14, #8, #10, Round #8, and a #1 liner brush. This class is for high school age to adult.

"The Cotton Patch Gospel" is a musical written by Tom Key and Russel Trez, featuring the music of singer/songwriter Harry Chapin. The story, inspired by Koinonia farm founder Clarence Jordan's translations of the Gospels, imagines what it would be like if Jesus were born in Gainesville, Georgia, in the 20th century. Those old Bible stories take on a new twist as Mary Hagler and Joe Davidson raise a most miraculous human.

What makes "The Cotton Patch Gospel" truly unique is the one-man performance by native Illinoisan Phillip Kaufmann. With permission from the Chapin family and through

the use of audio and video technology, Phillip portrays over 20 characters, plays 11 musical instruments, and sings his own backup vocals. His performance, combined with an excellent script, makes this a performance that you don't want to miss.

The show is even more enjoyable knowing that one hundred percent of the proceeds go to fight hunger. Fifty percent of all proceeds stay right here and support the Buddy Bags children's lunch program; 25 percent goes to WhyHunger, an organization founded by Harry Chapin and New York radio host & Catholic philanthropist, Bill Ayres; and the last 25 percent goes to the Mennonite Central Committee food program.

Thus far, Phil has taken his one-man show on the road for hunger, raising more than \$77,000 during the past two years. Why-Hunger lists Phil and his show along with artists like Bruce Springsteen, Carlos Santana, and Chicago in their efforts to fight hunger.

Summer Drama Camp registration now open

The Prairie Arts Council is pleased to announce registration for the 11th annual Children's Summer Drama Camp for children entering second through ninth grades. Camp runs for three hours, Monday-Friday, for two weeks. Two camp sessions will run June 10-21, one from 9 a.m. to noon and one from 2 to 5 p.m. There will also be a morning camp running July 8-19 if there is sufficient interest. The camp cost is \$85 with special rates for siblings. Need-based scholarships are also available upon request for those who meet the criteria.

Each camp session culminates in the performance (noon and 5 p.m. June 21 and noon on July 19) of an original play written specifically for the campers and, to a large extent, tailored to the needs and abilities of the campers. Previous camp productions include "Cinderella," "The Perfect Princess" (also known as "A Mixed-Up Fairy Tale" and "The Prince and the Pen Pal"), "The Evil of the Atkins Diet," "The Best-est Summer Ever" (also

known as "Picture This" and "Going Through the Frame: The Jour-



ney to Enilef"), and "Fish Out of Water: A Nautical Story" (also known as "A Mermaid's Tale"). Campers in each session of camp name their own production. Children get the hands-on experience of creating a show, from set and light work to costuming to performing.

Past guest speakers have included Dave Roden, who shared his knowledge of theatrical accents, sets, and Shakespeare; Angela Winger, costuming; Jan Seeds, stage make-up; Norm Engstrom of IVCC for mime; members of the IVCC comedy improv team; Stephen Kwiatek for choreography for the stage; Matt Boehm for stage lighting and design; Dane Suarez for musical theater and opera; and Nick Umbdenstock and Steve

Brown, who teach safe stage combat. Camp activities also include theater and improvisational games like you might see on the television show "Whose Line Is It Anyway?" and good, old-fashioned "camp" games like Telephone. Snacks are served daily.

Children's theater programming at PAC has always been about more than just theater skills. We strive to offer a safe, wholesome environment in which children can learn, grow, and have fun. Fostering the growth of our community's children is the greatest benefit of PAC children's theater programming.

PAC presents Afro-pop/reggae concert August 25

For the past four years, Prairie Arts Council has sponsored a summer outdoor concert at the Soldiers and Sailors Park and has brought a variety of entertainment for your musical enjoyment. This year we bring Mathew Tembo, an awardwinning Afro-pop and reggae musician hailing from Zambia, Southern Africa. He is an important ambassador of Zambian music culture both in America, where he resides now, and abroad.

Originally a reggae singer only, Tembo was approached while giving a presentation at the Rhythmic Conservatory in Copenhagen, Denmark, by one of the professors there. He was asked why he played reggae and not African music since he was from Africa. Upon returning home from that European tour in 2004, Tembo began a self-taught exploration of traditional African instruments

such as the silimba and kalumbu. He now incorporates the use of these instruments into his original compositions.

Mathew studied music education at Evelyn Hone College of Applied Arts and Commerce in Zambia majoring in classical piano and later studied primary education with a concentration in music at the University of Zambia. He continues his quest for higher education in DeKalb, Illinois, at the renowned school of music at Northern Illinois University where he is wrapping up his graduate degree in world music performance.

This summer concert is scheduled for 6 p.m. August 25. Bring your lawn chairs and sit back and enjoy! Refreshments will be available during the concert. This concert is free to the public and is funded in part by a grant from the Illinois Valley Fine Arts Trust.
