PAC to honor Doris Hamilton

Longtime music presence to receive Lifetime Achievement in the Arts award

Influential music educator and theater director Doris Hamilton will be the guest of honor at the 18th annual Prairie Arts Council Gala, *Mardi Gras Masquerade*, set for 7 p.m. Saturday, February 2, 2013, at Ye Olde Underground Inn in Princeton. Hamilton will be presented with the 4th annual Lifetime Achievements in the Arts award.

Hamilton was a graduate of Tiskilwa High School, received a bachelor's degree from Western Illinois University, and did graduate study work at the University of Illinois and Illinois State University.

Hamilton served as a music education teacher for Tiskilwa Elementary and High Schools for 35 years, providing K-12 music, theater and education programs for students. During her tenure at Tiskilwa schools, she developed a "Kids from Tiskilwa" group who performed throughout Illinois and were invited to participate in an event at Disney World and SeaWorld in Florida. Hamilton was a cooperative consultant for the Illinois Board of Education and a student teacher supervisor for Illinois State University. She has been recognized as an Out-

standing Teacher by the Institute for Development of Educational Activities and Outstanding Arts Educator in the state of Illinois by the Illinois Arts Alliance.

In addition to her involvement with K -12 education, Hamilton served as director of the Homestead musicals during Princeton's annual Homestead Festival for 35 years. She also directed several musicals at the Henry Dinner Theater.

6 Rms Riv Vu is the story of two strangers who meet when they respond to an ad in "The New York Times" for a river-view apartment. Paul Friedman is a married advertising copywriter, and Ann Miller a discontented housewife. They view the apartment, but before they can leave, discover that the door has accidentally been locked and they are trapped inside together. A connection quickly forms between them as they begin sharing things about their lives and find themselves attracted to one another.

The cast for this production comes from all over the Illinois Valley. Director Ken Schroeder
