Queen of Bingo



to roll in to PAC theater

In the tradition of the hilarious Harvey Korman and Tim Conway sketches from the old Carol Burnett Show comes the stage comedy "The Queen of Bingo" at the Prairie Arts Center, 24 Park Avenue East, Princeton, Illinois, on February 28 and March 1.

Sis and Babe, two sisters on the other side of 50, want to add a little fun and excitement to their lives, but where to find it?.... **BINGO!** Jeanne Michels and Phyllis Murphy's "The Queen of Bingo" catches Sis (Jill Marti) and Babe (Julie Grady) during bingo night at St. Joseph's Catholic Church. Over the rattle of bingo balls, the patter of a smooth-talking caller, and the smell of sweat from the boy's locker room, the women come to terms with life, love, winning, and losing.

The show comes steeped in the culture of bingo halls, big diamonds, daubers, and coveralls. Bingo (and its superstitions) remains enough a part of our shared culture that audiences can laugh as Marti unpacks a huge bag

filled with bingo supplies, good luck tokens, and a big coffee mug – then giggle again as Grady arrives with a 7-eleven mug the size of Connecticut, Troll dolls, and a good luck cross that she waves over her cards.

While the light-hearted show focuses mainly on silliness (characters in the bingo hall, an escaped mouse, Babe's attempts to evade love-happy Coach Anderson), it does veer into the serious. Sis, a widow, struggles with loneliness, while Babe fights the battle of the bulge. Surprise, surprise!! Bingo turns out to be the answer to both

their prayers!

The cast also includes the comedic talents of Utica's Karen Rogers and Princeton's Andy Marti. Jill Marti does double-duty as director for the show. The rest of the production staff includes Kathy Ballard, set designer; Maryhelen Bidasio, tickets; Dixie Schroeder, press/assistant director; and Elaine Russell and Patti Moynihan as co-chairs for the auction.

Performances for this hilarious comedy are set for 7 p.m. Saturday, February 28, and 2 p.m. Sunday, March 1. Ticket prices are \$18 for Saturday's performance, which includes the "Girls Night Out" event (see page 3).

Camera club shows 'Unlimited' talent

February exhibit kicks off 2015 gallery season

The Prairie Arts Council welcomes Princeton's Photography Unlimited club during the month of February as they exhibit some of their members' most recent photographic works in the PAC gallery. This exhibit begins with a wine and hors d'oeuvres reception honoring the photographers from 6 to 8 p.m. February 6. Friends and the public are welcome to attend.

The group was formed on January 12, 1978, and currently has 35 members. When asked about Photography Unlimited, past president Jon McCutchan said it's quite an active group of people. He reported that the group has had workshops on portrait photography, macro photography, Photoshop focus stacking and HDR (high dynamic range). As a group, they have visited several destinations in the region doing "mystery shoots," not revealing the location until the morning they gather for the three- to four-hour competition outing.

The group also has monthly photo challenges where they encourage members to find new shots of random topics around food, flowers, and babies. They have enjoyed programs presented by accomplished professional photographers at their annual banquet, and often have members bring work from their own projects.

In addition, the club sponsored a community -wide photo competition in the fall of 2014 that introduced the club

to many local photographers unaware of their activities. Many of its members have exhibited at the Bureau County Fair. The members have also participated in twice yearly "Friendly Four Club" contests with members of camera clubs from Sandwich, Streator, and Morris. Photography Unlimited recently hosted the 69th such competition in November.

The group meets at 7 p.m. on the

PAC remembers Aaron Porter in exhibit of his work

During the month of March, the Prairie Arts Council will honor the son of one of our members, Patti Moynihan. Aaron James Porter died in March of 2014. He was an up-and-coming young artist whose life was cut short by Huntington's Disease. His mother, Patti Moynihan of Princeton says this about her son:

"Ever since Aaron was able to hold a crayon in his hand he was drawing, coloring, and creating. Aaron never liked coloring books. He loved drawing his own creations, things from his own imagination. Aaron grew up in Princeton and graduated from Princeton High School. He attended Northern Illinois University, and after he married he moved to the

suburbs and later to Peoria.

"Aaron died March 16, 2014. He suffered from Huntingon's Disease. The worst thing about that disease was it robbed him of his ability to draw and paint. Huntington's Disease is also called Huntington's Chorea because there is involuntary motion and twitching that occurs as brain cells deteriorate. It is a genetic brain disorder that passes from one generation to another because of a chromosome that we all carry within ourselves. The trigger is unknown, but some families have it and most do not. This disease has taken his grandmother, two uncles, and just recently Aaron and then his father, Eric Porter.

"Because Aaron loved to draw and create his own characters, his artwork is very unique. If I were to place a label on it, I would say pen and ink drawings that are characters from another world, a world of Dungeons and Dragons and fantasy.

"I am so happy that I have his artwork to remember his creative spirit, his adventuresome nature, and his love of art. I am hoping that by showing his artwork it will inspire others to create and be free to express themselves."

Aaron's artwork can be viewed in the PAC fireplace room March 6-29 during open hours. This event is free and open to the public.



Zentangle

This fun, meditative, relaxing art form, sometimes referred to as "yoga for your brain," is quickly becoming popular among artists and non-artists alike. The goals of Zentangle are to increase focus and creativity while providing artistic satisfaction. A type of doodling, Zentangle is a pen and ink technique that encour-



ages creativity and relaxation with the use of invented repetitive patterns. Linda Fine, a certified Zentangle teacher who received her certification in June 2013 in Providence, Rhode Island, will show us how to get started with this fascinating process.
