# PAC Show Makes Memories

Leslee Nelson uses perhaps the most intimate art medium of all: Cloth Quilts that hug us. Napkins that dab our lips. Handkerchiefs that collect our tears. Textiles with memories serve as the canvas for Madison artist Nelson, who is displaying 30 years' worth of work during her solo show "Making Memory Cloths" running from March 4-27 at the Prairie Arts Center Gallery in Princeton. On March 5 from 1–3 p.m., Nelson also will sit down at our gallery table and invite anyone to make a "memory cloth" — a piece of handiwork that, through the meditative process of embroidery, helps stitch together the past."Whenever I have an exhibit and I'm there, people start telling me their stories and saying, 'I wish I could do that.' And I say, 'Well, of course you can. Go ahead," Nelson said of her memory cloths.

Nelson's retrospective at the Prairie Arts Gallery will include a broad range of work, from pieces incorporating hand-me-down quilt squares to multi-layered charm dolls and large, complex hangings made from Japanese Gampi paper. But the conversation pieces, literally, are



her memory cloths, sparked by an exhibit she saw in 2005 titled "The Art of War." Featured were memory cloths from South Africa: brightly colored fabrics embroidered with images from the maker's memory. Next to them hung the text of the stories behind the memories — experiences left out of the official record of South Africa's Truth and Reconciliation Commission. "They talked about how part of (the

process of memory cloths) was the making of it, and part of it was putting it on the wall until it no longer triggered a response," she said.

"They were so delighted that I had fallen in love with their process and was doing it here, too."

There will be a reception for Ms. Nelson on Friday, March 4 from 6-8 pm at the Prairie Arts Center Gallery. Also during her retrospective at the Prairie Arts Center Gallery, Nelson invites anyone to stop by between 1-3 p.m. on Saturday, March 5 to make their own memory cloth. She will have supplies available, but participants can choose to bring their own memory-imbued cloth, such as a table napkin or handkerchief.

### "Imagine That", The Art of Jeanne O'Melia: April 1-May 1

Jeanne O'Melia has studied art at Iowa State University and Augustana Collegeas well as at The Clearing in Door County, Wisconsin. Traveling extensively throughout the world, she makes line drawings in ink or paints in watercolor on location. Her drawings from travels and at home are the inspiration for cyanotype prints, acrylic paintings and found-object sculptures "I employ a variety of media to express my feelings and reactions to the world we live in," said O'Meila.

"I have been drawn to depicting the human figure since I first learned to draw. People come in all shapes and sizes and are fascinating to watch. Watercolor was the first medium I used. I still take my watercolors, paper and a sketch book with me on trips, even biking or kayaking," O'Melia said.

About 20 years ago O'Melia began making sculptural figures from found objects, brazing metals together. Growing up on a farm near Princeton, she knew about welding. Most metal scraps were found during bicycle tours. "I've added dumpster diving to gather a wider range of found objects. Gradually I have used other materials--plastic, paper, and even cigarette butts. A variety of adhesives are used to hold the pieces together including JB Weld and Gel Medium," she added.

"I have been creating large papiermâché heads for years. They get burned with their clothed, firecrack er filled bodies each New Year's Eve at midnight. It makes a great celebration. Many ethnic groups have used papier mâché in art and for festivals, and I've always been



fascinated by them," O'Meila said. This exhibit contains my latest

The year 2015 marked the 20th anniversary of the founding of the Prairie Arts Council. The annual gala fundraiser held in October was a celebration of that event. Honored that evening were founders Deb Young, John Henning, Ron McCutchan and the late Mary Win Walter-Norris. Also honored for his contribution in setting up the not for profit corporation was Attorney Robert Russell. Each were asked to recall events leading up to the forming of the organization. Young stated that in the spring of 1995 she contacted McCutchan, Henning and Norris to ask if they would be interested in helping her start an Arts Council in Princeton. She remembers that each one, without hesitation, agreed to help in any way they could. Bob Russell was contacted by John Henning to

inquire about his willingness to help with all of the legalities of setting up a not for profit corporation status. Russell agreed and the organization was on its way to becoming an entity which could help promote the arts in our community and the surrounding area. The group met monthly (and sometimes weekly) in various locations around Princeton as planning became a priority in what the expectations would be of an Arts Council. Shortly after, Denise Gordon volunteered to fill the position of Secretary and Henning approached Chuck Gebhardt who later consented to fill the position of Treasurer. After the first newspaper article was published regarding the formation of the Prairie Arts Council, Nedda Simon was the first person to call

Deb Young and express a desire to fill a position on the newly formed Board of Directors of the Prairie Arts Council.

Months later it became clear that in order to become a viable source in the eyes of the community and to make all of the ideas and dreams come true, the organization needed a physical location to become visible and help the community realize that this is a serious group of people who intended to present many arts opportunities. One year later, the Prairie Arts Council purchased the former Christian Science Church on the Court House Square as their physical location. The Prairie Arts Center is now home for the Prairie Arts Council and its many activities offered throughout the year.
